A LETTER from Pastor Andy

April is upon us and that means Spring weather. It means new life will start to emerge. The flowers will start blooming, if they aren't already. The trees will start budding out new leaves. The grass will start growing, which means the lawn mower needs to get serviced and ready to use. I love this time of year when everything comes out of its dormancy, and we see new life take shape.

As I think about new life bursting forth, a couple of Scripture texts come to mind:

Isaiah 43:19 – “For I am about to do something new. See, I have already begun! Do you not see it? I will make a pathway through the wilderness. I will create rivers in the dry wasteland. The wild animals in the fields will thank me, the jackals and the owls, too, for giving them water in the desert. Yes, I will make rivers in the dry wasteland so my chosen people can be refreshed.”

And also, Revelation 21:5 – “And the one sitting on the throne said, ‘Look, I am making everything new.’”

God is in the business of the doing new things. And God is doing new things here at FUMC with the new pastor, Bill Hargis and his wife, Cher, moving to West Plains sometime in June. And I believe God has great plans for FUMC. Jeremiah 29:11 says, “‘For I know the plans I have for you,’ says the Lord. ‘They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope.’”

So, please keep Bill and Cher in your prayers as they make this move. Keep FUMC in your prayers during this season of transition. And keep Jeanne and I in your prayers as we make our move back home to Oklahoma and settle in Ponca City.

Now let me share with you a couple of scheduling items.

Every four years United Methodists from all over the world meet together for what is called General Conference. There are usually somewhere around 800 to 900 clergy and the same amount of laity who were elected in their respective Annual Conferences to attend General Conference. I know that many of you have been keeping track on what's going on with the United Methodist Church denomination around the subject of human sexuality and the wording in the United Methodist Book of Discipline concerning that topic. These discussions have been taking place at General Conference since the 1970s and just in the last

ten or so years has it really kind of taken over a lot of the conversation in our denomination. Something will come to a head at this year's General Conference. And to be honest with you, I don't know what that will be. I don't have a crystal ball to look into the future to see what will happen. I've read some of the reports leading up to General Conference just you can and have.

General Conference is scheduled for April 23 thru May 3 in Charlotte, NC. If you would like to watch it, you can find it live streamed. You can google UMC General Conference 2024 and there you will be able to find a link to view it.

Here's what we're going to do to prepare ourselves for General Conference. On Sunday night, April 21, we will meet in the sanctuary for a time of prayer. We will pray for all the delegates that are attending. We will pray for the Holy Spirit to have room to move. We will pray for God's will to be done. I feel like this is important for us heading into General Conference. I'm inviting you to join me as we lift our Church, the United Methodist Church up to God.

The next scheduling item I want to share with you takes place on Sunday, May 5. Laura Murphy from the Missouri United Methodist Foundation will be here to present a grant check to Hattie Patillo on our behalf for the upgrade we made to our security cameras. We were given a matching Challenge grant of \$3,000 which means that we, as a church, had to come up with \$3,000 of our own, then the Foundation would present us with the check. Through your extravagant generosity, we were able to exceed that amount. So, Laura will be here to present that check at both services.

I want to take this opportunity to publicly thank Hattie for her work so that we could get this grant. It was through Hattie's diligence during the grant writing process and all the follow-up things that needed to take place that we were able to apply and ultimately receive this grant. When you see Hattie around the church, give her a big thanks for her work on this.

That same day during the Sunday school hour, Laura Murphy will present an abbreviated version of a program that the Foundation has called "Putting Your House in Order." This program focuses on end-of-life financial planning, which

probably none of us really wants to think about that much. The workshop itself actually lasts for about 90 minutes, so, during the Sunday school hour she will give some overviews of the workshop and what it entails. We can then decide if we would like her to come back at some point to share the entire workshop with us. You will hear more about this in the coming weeks. But I would like you to be in prayer about this and want to invite you to attend her presentation during the Sunday school hour on May 5th.

There is a lot happening here at FUMC over the next couple of months. I want to encourage you to attend worship with your fellow congregants and be an encouraging voice for each other as we navigate transition together.

The outcome can very well be a GOOD change, but again, the uncertainty brings with it much trepidation.

All that said, with these changes on the horizon, it is maybe a tiny bit hard for me to simply enjoy the current season that I'm in. But, if I'm only focusing on the future, full of trepidation because I don't know exactly what's next, WHAT in the world might I be missing in the here and now? I would hate to think that I missed the mighty presence of God as He moves through both worship services each and every Sunday. I would hate to miss the laughter and conversations taking place in the parlor here at the church on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of every month as a group of "stitchers" come together to work on prayer shawls (among other projects). I would hate to miss the enthusiasm and excitement of the Praise Team as we come together on Tuesday evenings to work on our worship setlists for the week. I would hate to miss the beauty of the bell choir or chancel choir on Wednesday evenings, as beautiful notes are transformed into amazing harmonies that glorify God. I would hate to miss ANY of those things, and that's only a fraction of the weekly activities at the church that bring so much joy. Greetings Church Family,

HE IS RISEN, JESUS CHRIST IS RISEN INDEED. I hope you, your family & friends and church family were able to celebrate this most amazing event this Easter. We worship the risen Lord.

One of the highlights for your Administrative Council this month was meeting the new pastor that our Bishop and Cabinet have assigned to West Plains to replace the vacancy left when Pastor Andy announced he was going to serve a church in his home state of Oklahoma. Bill Hargis and his wife, Cher are excited to begin their ministry here on July 1. Watch your newsletter for the date and time when we will celebrate Pastor Andy's time here at FUMC West Plains, and wish him well in his new appointment.

Your council has been working on safety issues around our church for months. You will see some of these changes in the next few weeks. Hattie Patillo has been instrumental in seeking a challenge grant from the UMC Conference for replacing our old, outdated security cameras. The Conference portion of the cost of the cameras will be presented to our church during worship services on April 7. We are also in the process of installing a safety window between the lobby and the church office. This will allow Falana to see who is in our lobby and help visitors to our church.

Our church building is a beautiful, but old building. Some of the building issues we are dealing with now are our heating system in the west side of the church, the mechanical curtain system in the CLC, the fire suppression system in the CLC kitchen and an old electrical fuse box on the west side of the church. Some of these issues are critical safety issues and need replacement, so you may notice some additional construction activity over the next month.

Spring is here. Along with redbud & dogwood blossoms we often see damaging weather events this time of year. Chris Patillo has been taking care of the church's "disaster" trailer. Our intent is to use this trailer for light storm cleanup within 150 miles of West Plains. If you would like to be active in helping other communities deal with severe weather events, please contact our church office.

We are beginning the process of finding someone to fill the much-needed position of youth leader for our church. Please keep this very important position in prayer that God will lead us to the right person.

After more than a decade of leadership in our church, Len Campo has made the decision to step away from his position on the Administrative Council. We certainly thank him for his service all these years. Melody Martin will fill his position on the Council. Melody has been very active in the leadership of many of our church's ministries. Please thank her for taking on this additional responsibility of serving on your Council.

Family Ministry

Last day of March ended with beautiful Easter services here at First United. I so enjoyed the music, the message, the laughter, and business of it all. And, oh how I loved the children and their contribution to the services. But this newsletter is going to take a strange twist as I move from March to April very abruptly, so bear with me.

This year, the day after Easter was April Fool's Day. Most mornings at about 4:30 am, I start with a cup of coffee and two mindless games on my phone. One is Wordle and the other is Connections. Both challenge me, but they also allow me just a moment to not be too serious in the quiet of my own space before the day really starts. Connections has 16 words that have 4 categories, and it is my challenge to group them correctly within 4 plays. Fun right? I have played this game for months and secretly look forward to the challenge. But....April 1st, they put emojis instead of words! First of all pictures, but emojis? I use very few emojis (mostly hearts, smiles, and maybe eyerolls), so I didn't even know what part of them were. It caught me off guard and I felt a little uncomfortable. April Fool's, and they got me. But after I took a step back and took the time to research a few of the emojis I didn't know, and I proceeded with the idea that this was no different than any other morning, I was able to accurately complete the task at hand with no errors.

Following my mindless game play, I begin to lay out in my mind the items that will be my work challenges for the day. I pray, I carefully consider each area that is in my lane and that is my responsibility. I try very hard to take a mind photograph of each ministry, family, people group, leaders, etc. and apply God's will and desire to all of them so they are not just a picture, but part of a much bigger continuous movie. I ask God, what he would have me do, how can I help to seamlessly marry each ministry into a full "Kingdom minded" approach. And then, I go to the office. I make phone calls, I prepare lessons, I fix problems as they arise, I help with outreach, I smile as much as possible, and I cry with people as they go through hard moments in their journey. And then, April Fool's Things can be so different than I planned or expected.

Reactions are unexpected, (good or bad), maybe I missed a connection, maybe I didn't start with, "God laid this on my heart", because He does, you know, maybe I didn't contact everyone that needed to be in the loop, or maybe people missed the email, memo, text message, or the information as it scrolled across the screen. I can receive emails, notes, or spoken words that are good or bad, but they are sometimes unexpected either way. So, I have to pause, reevaluate, keep the mission in mind (God) and start again. Connections, the game, sometimes says, "one move away." And it can be a struggle to figure out that one move that will complete the connection successfully. But God knows I do try.

The church has many working parts. We all have a part to play, and by church, I speak of far beyond these walls of First United Methodist Church. We are but a small part of the whole. Each ministry within our walls is a small part of the whole of our church. Each person is a small but vital part of the whole of each ministry. Each director and leader in the church is a small part of putting together and nurturing the ministries that will reach far beyond our walls. April

Fool's does happen to all of us sometimes, but accepting the challenge to realize that a positive outcome can be reached if we just take time to look at the things we may not fully understand. Being able to see and recognize that things can be grouped differently than initially thought is a vital part of working within the calls God has so carefully and wonderfully blessed each of us with. I know what it is like when I make a wrong choice in my game of Connections. I watch the little dots disappear as I approach the point of failure. I'm not gonna lie though, sometimes, I get to my last dot during the day and think I am about to fail when that amazing positive connection comes along that saves me! Luckily, God doesn't only give us four finite chances to make accurate connections each day. I am so thankful for the many positive comments and connections that I get daily that save me from failure.

With that being said, our church has a few particular needs that are a vital part of the ministries that will ultimately meet the needs of a growing church community here at FUMC. Children are not just a product of our future but are our future. We need parents and grandparents to help every week in the classrooms. Children are a fundamental part of our church. Parents are a vital part of the future of our church. Attending services is an important part of growing and encouraging a church community that is vibrant.

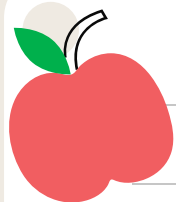
